Year 9 Crossroads Program

We are thrilled to announce to our community that Murtoa College in conjunction with the Wimmera Southern Mallee LLEN will commence running our own innovative Community Volunteering project for our Year 9 students from the start of Term 3. This unique project is purposefully designed to support our students to become constructive members of the community, prepare our students for future work and study and assist our students' efforts to complete volunteering hours required to complete their Certificate II in Active Volunteering which all Year 9 students commenced at the beginning of this year.

This project will see all Year 9 students undertaking a volunteer placement every second Friday in Horsham in a not-for-profit organisation where they will learn about volunteering and gain skills in community service. These placements include: Sunnyside Lutheran Retirement Village, Grampians Health Day Centre, Maydale Reserve, Salvation Army, Craft for a Cause, Wimmera Library, Ladies Auxiliary Op Shop, Christian Emergency Food Centre and Makers' Gallery. For these visits, our Year 9 students are required to wear their Murtoa College Year 9 Crossroads uniform - shirt, rugby jumper and hat - designed by our students and subsidised by the Wimmera Southern Mallee LLEN.

This is a fantastic opportunity for our students to become active volunteers and gain valuable skills. Students wishing to work in aged care organisations such as Sunnyside Lutheran Retirement Village and the Grampians Health Day Centre are required to have proof (use MyGOV site/app) of Two (2) Covid Vaccinations and a current Flu Vaccination before they can be accepted for the placement. For these two placements, students will also need to wear a mask at the placement and complete a Covid Rapid Antigen Test (RAT test) each day of placement.

Building Works Update - Early Learning Childhood Centre

Following discussions with the Victorian Building Authority and the builder, additional measures have been put in place to minimise construction impacts on our school community as building works resumed earlier this week. These measures include the implementation of traffic management plan which includes:

- Limiting heavy construction vehicles accessing the construction site between 8.00 9.00 am and 3.00 3.45 pm
- Using clear signs, bollards and traffic management controllers at the two vehicle access points into the construction site from Web Street.
- Traffic controllers are wearing high visibility vests. During the school day, they may request you and/or your child/ren to stop whilst vehicles enter or exit the site.
- All students and families are reminded to adhere to all signs and the traffic controllers.

As a school, we have also put measures in place which includes actively manning our school crossing before school (8.30-8.45 am) and afterschool (3.15 - 3.30 pm), clearing the gravelled car park area which we ask parents to reverse park into whilst dropping off and/or picking up their children. We also remind our families to please exit and/or enter their child from the kerbside doors in their vehicles if they are parked in the limited number of spots directly outside the school and not to park in front of the marked disability car space when doing drop off and/or pick up. My sincere thanks go to all families who have so quickly pivoted to these changed measures over the past 2 weeks, and to our Maintenance and Facilities Manager - Mr Colin Winch - who so quickly jumped in to provide supervision at our school crossing to help us keep all students safe since the construction of the ELCC commenced.

Building Works Update - School

Renovations and building works are well underway and will continue over the upcoming break. At the time of writing, the front Administration building is being fenced off to prepare for restumping/levelling works. As a direct consequence, the front office is now located in Room 5 (the first room) of the front Technology Building. This is where families can pick up their child/ren, sign out child/ren, or seek assistance for all other front office matters (e.g uniform, returning permission forms etc).

As part of this work, asbestos is scheduled for removal from Monday, 1 July, to Friday, 12 July, 2024. We take this opportunity to remind our families that our school is safe. The health and safety of our school community is paramount, and we are working with the Victorian School Building Authority and independent occupational hygienists to appropriately manage this work. A licensed removalist has been engaged to remove the materials. The removalist will be supervised by an independent occupational hygienist, who will also conduct air monitoring. To ensure everyone's safety and the timely completion of works, it is important that community members are not on the school grounds during the works.

Navigating Generative AI Tools at School

As Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools like ChatGPT become more prevalent, it's important for our school community to understand their potential risks and how to use them safely. I am sure many parents/carers have read the many news articles and clips highlighting some high-end problems associated with its misuse. These tools can generate human-like text, images, code and more based on prompts or inputs. While useful, they also pose dangers we must be aware of.

Privacy and Data Risks

One major concern is privacy and data protection. Many Generative AI tools may collect personal or sensitive information from prompts and inputs to improve their models. This data could be stored indefinitely and potentially misused. We urge students and families never to input any personal, health, or sensitive details into these tools.

Inaccuracy and Bias

The outputs from Generative AI can often contain inaccuracies, biases, and even harmful content. We must fact-check any information from these tools and not blindly trust it as truthful or unbiased. Their training data and models can reflect societal biases.

Intellectual Property Concerns

There are also intellectual property implications, as Generative AI outputs could potentially violate copyrights. We need to be cautious about using these tools for academic work without proper attribution.

Proactive Approach

To safely integrate Generative AI, our school will:

- Restrict student access to only approved, properly configured tools
- Provide guidance on responsible, ethical usage
- Monitor for any misuse or privacy/safety violations
- Work closely with parents to ensure proper supervision at home

We encourage open conversations between parents and students about Generative AI. Together, we can realise its potential benefits while mitigating risks through proactive education and policies.

Alarming Rise in Misogyny Amongst Boys

Teachers across the country are sounding the alarm about a disturbing trend emerging in schools – a growing culture of sexist language, harassment, and an expressed belief in male superiority among many young boys. This phenomenon, dubbed the "Andrew Tate effect" by some, appears to be fuelled by the rise of influencer figures like Tate who espouse misogynistic views and present an idealised version of toxic masculinity.

The problem appears to be widespread, with teachers from diverse communities reporting similar experiences. Often things are said that are shockingly sexist and misogynistic, and when you call them out, they either double down or claim they were just joking.

While popular influencers are one driver, experts point to deeper societal issues around portrayals of masculinity and a normalisation of sexist attitudes that must be addressed through education and shifting cultural narratives, which is where schools, parents/carers and our whole communities need to come together to tackle this problem. We need to have open and honest conversations about gender roles, respect, and human dignity from an early age. We tackle this through the teaching of Respectful Relationships at school, but it needs to be more than in a lesson. It is how we model these behaviours around our young people.

Reversing this culture will likely require concerted efforts across our communities to uplift values of equality, empathy and mutual respect between all genders. At Murtoa College we promote a zero-tolerance approach to tackle the problem. Naming and confronting sexism directly can be the first step in creating a safer and more inclusive learning environment.

NAPLAN Results



Agricultural Science News - Tara Crowe

Primary Ag Science







Over the past few weeks, upper primary students have been delving into the fascinating world of germination through the growing of bean seeds. They have put their new knowledge into practice by pricking out and potting on a variety of native Australian wildflowers. Using dibbling sticks, the students carefully handled the young seedlings by their leaves, ensuring not to damage the delicate stems.

Among the plants they potted were Everlastings and Coral Creeper, adding a vibrant touch to their gardening experience. In addition to potting, the students have been actively involved in improving the garden bed around the Agriculture classroom. Working together as a team, they moved a large pile of mulch and cleared out any remaining weeds. Their hard work has transformed the garden, which now looks much better and is ready for the wildflowers to be planted once they are big enough.

This hands-on project has not only enhanced their understanding of plant care and teamwork but also beautified the school grounds with the promise of blooming native wildflowers.

Mushrooms in Schools

We are thrilled to announce that our Primary Ag Science program has successfully secured the Mushroom in Schools kit. This hands-on, inquiry-based learning project will enrich our students' education by integrating Mathematics, Science, Humanities, and Social Science while exploring the fascinating life cycle of mushrooms.



The kit is expected to arrive before the end of Term 2, just in time to kick off in Term 3. This project will be especially valuable for our students as it highlights the unique nature of mushrooms. Unlike fruits or vegetables, mushrooms are fungi and belong to a separate food kingdom. Understanding this distinction is crucial for children, as mushrooms grow in a very unique way and have a completely different nutrition profile compared to other foods.

We look forward to the arrival of the kit and the incredible learning opportunities it will provide for our students.


Free Chemical Users Course in Horsham

Grades F, 1, 2 Agricultural Science, Semester 1 Report- Joylene Boehm

In Term 1, the children across Grades F, 1 & 2 examined soils to understand that there are different soils, and not all of these are suitable for growing food. They became aware that soil is a living environment, not just for plants, but for little creatures who can help us enrich the soil. We chose to study worms and their relationship to plant growth. Worm farms were set up so that the children could look after and watch how the worms behaved in their daily life. The kids observed what the worms produced to enhance plant life, and how we could use the tailings in our garden. Throughout the children were involved in classroom explicit learning, follow- up activities as well as the practical task of setting up and looking after the worm farms.

In Term 2 the focus moved to the garden beds and food planting. The Grades F, 1 & 2 learnt about the structure of plants as well as how they worked as part of the living environment. They discovered what plants needed to grow and that different plants grow in different seasons. The children assisted with preparing the garden beds. After doing some work on companion planting as a class they designed different ways we could position plants in garden beds, so that the plants helped one another in a variety of ways. The children were involved in planting both seeds and seedlings in the garden beds. The final part of this unit involved understanding what vegetables are. They learnt that we eat different parts of plants, there are five main food groups, and each food group plays an important part in keeping us healthy. To finish the term the children were involved in cooking vegetables.






Student Wellbeing, Inclusion & Engagement Team




All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian Premier and former Premiers.




