Welcome back to Term 3. We hope all students and families enjoyed a relaxing break, and that everyone is ready for what is already shaping up to be a very busy Term 3!

Year 9 Crossroads Program

Today marks the very first day our Year 9 students are attending their Volunteering placements in Horsham as part of our exciting new Year 9 Crossroads Program. We sincerely thank staff from the Wimmera Southern Mallee LLEN (Local Learning & Employment Network) who we have been working closely with since the start of 2024 to bring to life opportunities for our Year 9 students to complete their 20 hours of Volunteer work required to complete their Certificate II in Active Volunteering. Positive Learning Environment

I firmly believe learning is inherently a positive process and crucial to every child's development. For this reason, for the remainder of this year we are paying particular attention to the importance of ensuring every classroom is a Positive Learning Environment. This means we will actively provide opportunities for our students, staff and families to work together to ensure all students consistently enact excellent behaviour standards which demonstrate respect for oneself, one another, our Education Support, Teaching and Leadership staff, our school environment, and our broader community. Underwritten by the belief that every student has the right to learn, and every teacher has the right to teach, free from disruption, distraction or concern for their wellbeing or safety, a Positive Learning Environment once fully realised creates a climate of learning that inspires every student to feel safe in their efforts to achieve learning outcomes they might otherwise never have imagined. This, in turn, opens the door for all our students to develop not only a love for learning that they will take with them into their adult lives but also the essential understanding that hard work, effort and thinking beyond one's own needs is essential to overcoming challenges and discovering lifelong passions and interests.

Construction Update - Early Learning Centre

As you know the Victorian Government is building a new early learning and childcare centre (ELCC) at our school. The centre will open in 2025 and will offer kindergarten and long day care for up to 57 local children each day. Our centre is one of 50 government-owned and operated, affordable early learning and childcare centres that will be set up across Victoria as part of the \$14 billion Best Start, Best Life reforms. The Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) is managing all building works for the project.

Construction continued over the holidays and has been progressing well. Thus far the contractors have established the ELCC site by undertaking bulk excavations and preparing the carpark with rock import and crushed rock. Over the next two weeks, ground services will be installed and crushed rock will be laid on top of the grassed pathway leading to and/or from our school crossing across the paddock that our pedestrian and bike riding students have been using as a safer alternative to using the footpaths outside the ELCC Site Office and current building site. This is indeed excellent news given the wet weather we will continue to experience over the coming months. We take this opportunity to remind all students and families to adhere to all traffic signs, traffic management controllers at the two vehicle access points into the construction site, and use our staffed school crossing before and after school.









The VSBA has created a dedicated webpage for the project so you can track its progress and an indicative site plan is attached to show the construction zone and location of the new centre. College Building Works

Substantive renovation works are also continuing within the school. Over the holidays, the stadium floors were sanded back, re-varnished, sealed and polished, and a new classroom space was created from the former squash court. This has included new plastering, and the installation of new doors and architraves both in this space and our existing multipurpose room in the stadium. In our Front Administration building, restumping preparation works were completed over the break, which included removing carpets and flooring, and digging out stumping holes to facilitate stumping pours which took place this week. In the Technology building, our contractors have been busy finishing off our renovations by touching up plastering works, and fitting new doors. In the months ahead, substantive works will also be undertaken throughout the College to ensure our current ramps and handrails are suitable for providing unimpeded access for all students and visitors to the College. We deeply appreciate the way our families, students and staff have - and continue to - adapt to the temporary measures and/or spaces we have put in place to accommodate these important building works.

New Wednesday Afternoon Primary Program

Commencing next week, our secondary school teachers will join forces with our primary teaching team and education support staff to provide our primary students from Foundation to Year 6 with an opportunity to engage in an exciting new suite of extracurricular activities after lunch on Wednesday afternoons. Designed to support the development of relationships between students and staff, and promote the development of soft skills - creativity, critical thinking, interpersonal social skills, resilience, curiosity, collaboration, teamwork, empathy plus many more. To jumpstart our program from next week, students will rank their top three (3) preferences in a short survey that they will complete with their classroom teachers early next week. Student numbers are capped to keep groups small, with vertical groupings of students from Years F-6 rather than one grade level. The following options will be on offer: Art & Craft (F-6), Thinking & Science (F-6), Instruments (F-6), Choir (F-6), Junior Volleyball Academy (4-6), Pony Grooming (F-6); Advance Boardgames (4-6); Bookclub (F-6), Making & Tinkering (3-6), Chilling out/Zen Club (F-6). Students will have an opportunity to switch their preferences and try two different activities (5 weeks per activity) in Term 4.

2024 Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey

Next week our school community will be invited to participate in the 2024 Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey (PCGOS). This important annual survey provides us with an opportunity to actively engage with our families, and provides an important indicator of how well our school community is meeting the needs of our students. Designed to assist our efforts to gain an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement, our College will use the PCGOS survey results to inform school planning and develop programs and initiatives to best support our students. The Department of Education will also use the results for research purposes and to improve outcomes for students more broadly. Instructions for how families can engage with the PCGOS, an opportunity which will remain open until Friday 30 August, will be sent out via a Xuno news post to families next week.

2024 NAPLAN Reporting Packages

We are in the process of making arrangements to distribute printed Individual Student Reports for all students who participated in NAPLAN testing earlier this year. For eligible Year 9 students, these Individual Reports will be accompanied by NAPLAN Certificate/s of Achievement which are awarded to celebrate Year 9 students who achieved the 'exceeding' standard for Reading and/or Numeracy. A Xuno news post will be sent out to families on the same day these Reports are being brought home by students so that families know to ask their child/ren for their NAPLAN report on the day. As we come closer to the end of the year, many Year 12 students have begun to experience a broad range of mixed feelings about what's to come for the rest of the year. A growing sense of anticipation, anxiety, and excitement accompanies our mutual acknowledgement that the last remaining months of 2024 are a crucial time in our educational journey. The intensity of this situation is heightened by our constant worry about what results we will achieve and whether our ATAR scores will be sufficient to gain admission into the universities of our choice. This uncertainty and the high expectations placed upon us - and that we place upon ourselves - contributes significantly to our stress levels.

On the other hand, our VCE peers who are not planning on going to university are becoming increasingly happy that our final year is nearly over. They look forward to finishing their secondary education and moving on to the next chapter of their lives, whatever that may be. For them, this is a time of relief and excitement as they prepare to embark on new adventures outside the academic realm. This includes my peers who are completing their VCE VM (Victorian Certificate of Education Vocational Major) certificate whose focus is on gaining practical skills and knowledge that will help them succeed in their chosen careers.

This particularly applies to some of my peers who are currently engaged in school-based apprenticeships. These students are excited to continue with their apprenticeships and are passionate about achieving their long-term career goals. Their combination of hands-on experience and formal education provides them with a solid foundation for future success in their respective trades and professions. Overall, this time of the year is filled with a mix of emotions for Year 12 students.

While the journey thus far has been challenging, we all acknowledge that the next few months signals a time of great opportunity and hope for the future for us all.

Glasses for Kids

The Glasses for Kids inNext week initiative is a vital program aimed at ensuring that young students have access to essential eye care services. This initiative, primarily targeting children in Prep to Year 3, provides free vision screenings, further eye testing if necessary, and free glasses to eligible students in participating schools across Victoria. The Glasses for Kids team will be onsite next Wednesday and Thursday. There may be last minute availability for interested parents.

Key Features

- Free Vision Screening: All participating students will receive a vision screening conducted by qualified optometrists.
- Further Testing: If initial screenings indicate a potential issue, students will undergo additional assessments.
- Prescription Glasses: For those requiring glasses, optometrists will assist in selecting frames and ordering
 prescriptions, with glasses delivered to schools approximately three weeks after the screening.
- Parental Involvement: Parental consent is required for participation, ensuring families are informed and involved in their child's eye health.

Importance of the Initiative

The Glasses for Kids program plays a crucial role in breaking the cycle of disadvantage that often correlates with access to healthcare. By providing these services in schools, the initiative promotes early awareness of eye health and helps alleviate barriers to education caused by vision impairments.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Our school is participating in the annual Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). This important process helps schools and governments better understand and support students with disability.

The NCCD involves collecting information about:

- Students receiving disability support
- Types of disabilities (physical, cognitive, sensory, or social/emotional)
- Levels of educational adjustments provided

This data allows us to:

- Recognise and strengthen support for students with disability
- Improve learning programs and outcomes
- Share best practices among educators

It's important to note that:

- No individual student will be identifiable in the data
- Student privacy is protected by law
- No additional testing is required

The NCCD helps inform funding and policy decisions to better support students with disability across Australia.

Sport and Recreation working with local primary schools

As the year progresses, we will be engaging with other local primary schools (Minyip, Rupanyup) to include them with the long-term plan for our students to run a tabloid sports event with all primary schools present.

By implementing this peer-led program, we aim to create a smoother, more positive experience for all students as they progress through their educational journey. We believe this initiative will contribute to a strong sense of belonging and academic readiness in years to come.

Learning and Teaching Executive Team

Director of Responsive Teaching - Dr Cindy Thompson

There are a number of academic competitions coming up this term. These are a great opportunity for students to challenge themselves and identify previously untapped potential. As students' progress through school, these competitions are a great way for students to collect evidence of participation in extracurricular activities that may help them when applying for jobs or further study.

ANZ Maths Rockstars Competition (Years 3 to 9)

This competition is running through the MangaHigh portal and can be accessed by all our students in Year 3 to Year 9 as they currently have a MangaHigh account. Students do not need to register for this competition.

The competition will run between 12 August and 22 August, and students are encouraged to complete as many activities and games as possible during this time. Teachers may set activities or students may choose their own activities outside the classroom. Each medal earned from an activity adds points to the individual's tally.

- Gold medal adds 3 points
- Silver medal adds 2 points
- Bronze medal adds 1 point.

As students advance through the challenge, they can earn certificates based on points accumulated. Some of the certificates on offer include "Maths Maestro," "Equation Expert," "Number Ninja," and "Algebra Ace." This is a great opportunity for students to spend time outside of school consolidating their maths skills.

EP ANZ Science Championships (Years 7 to 10)

This competition is running through the Education Perfect portal and can be accessed by all our students in Years 7 to 10 as they currently have an Education Perfect account. Students do not need to register for this competition.

The EPSC will be held for schools across Australia and New Zealand between Monday 12 August and Friday 16 August 2024. This competition celebrates learning and achievement in Science while providing curriculum-aligned content for students to earn points and participate with competitors all around Australia and New Zealand. The competition will be visible in the Competitions Tab in each student's account during the competition week.

Students of all abilities are invited to answer science questions on EP to earn points and a place on the scoreboard. Every correct answer will earn a point. Students can access the competition content by clicking into the competition, and then *Compete*. Or by completing any Science content within the EP platform. Any points earned during tasks set by teachers during this timeframe will count towards the competition. Students are able to revisit content to earn additional points. After their first attempt at any question, they can complete it again after 24 hours.

Australian Mathematics Competition (Years 3 to 12)

The Australian Mathematics Competition is Australia's longest running, largest and most well-known maths competition for school students. The AMC contains unique problems designed each year by leading educators and academics to challenge and extend your students' problem-solving skills.

The AMC consists of 30 questions and runs for between 60 and 75 minutes depending on the year level of the student. Topics potentially covered on the paper include:

- Basic arithmetic
- Fractions and ratios
- Algebra and pre-algebra
- Geometry
- Measurement
- Statistics and probability
- Problem-solving (including enumeration)

If students wish to enter this competition they need to email Dr Thompson (<u>cindy.thompson@education.vic.gov.au</u>) by Thursday 1 August. The competition will run in the second week of August.

The ACER Advance Awards for Schools Competition (Years 7 to 9)

The ACER Advance Awards for Schools Competition is available for Years 7,8 and 9 and is designed to challenge top performing students. The ACER Advance Awards for Schools competition covers two different learning areas: Numeracy and Literacy. Both multiple-choice assessments are designed to measure students' problem solving and reasoning abilities and encourage them to use their higher order thinking skills to apply known concepts to new situations. Students must sit both learning areas to participate in the competition.



Hydrosight Moisture Probes

The Hydrosight moisture probes have been highly effective, providing clear indications of moisture levels in both the polyhouse and the wicking beds. Currently, these probes serve as real-time monitors, helping us determine when the plants in the polyhouse need watering and showing the impact of recent rainfall on the wicking beds. In the future, they could be invaluable for investigations involving different soil types.

Wicking beds

The wicking bed market garden area is continuing to be developed with four more beds completed and put into place earlier this week. These will join our current beds for the Summer growing season. Thanks to Ross and Luke Sudholz for helping to continue the development of this area.



VCE Agricultural and Horticultural Studies

AgXtra Crop Trials

Our crop trial at the Rupanyup site is progressing well, currently at the 2-3 leaf stage, or BBCH 12-13. AgXtra has treated the trial with several herbicides and insecticides. Before sowing, IBS (incorporated by sowing) sprays were applied, including glyphosate, oxyfluorfen, trifluralin, triallate, bifenthrin, and chlorpyrifos. A few days post-sowing, PSPE (post sowing, pre-emergence) sprays were applied, containing bifenthrin, prosulfocarb, and s-metachlor. An EPE (early post emergence) spray will be applied when weather conditions improve, as high winds and intermittent rain last week were not conducive to spraying. Our VCE students will visit the site on Friday, the 26th July, to observe its progress and learn about growth stages in cereal crops.



Pruning Apple Trees

Unit 2 of Agricultural and Horticultural Studies focuses on plant production. As part of the practical tasks required in this unit, the students gave our school apple trees a much-needed trim. They chose to prune heavily, sacrificing next season's fruit to reduce the trees' height, allowing for the installation of hoops to support bird netting and protect future production. Further work in the coming weeks will include cleaning up under the trees, resetting the watering system, and mulching.



Primary Ag Science

Eggs and Chickens in Class

Our primary students have started a unit on egg production this term. They had a feathery visitor to help identify the external anatomy of a chicken and discussed various poultry breeds. Year 5/6 students have explored how eggs are formed and why not all eggs hatch into chickens. The incubator is warming up, ready for egg setting in the coming days. During this period, students will learn about chicken development, and if we are lucky, we will candle the eggs to observe the chicks' development. The unit will also cover oviparous animals and the diverse sizes, colors, and shapes of their eggs. We extend our gratitude to Jill and Keith Elliot for the use of their incubator and brooding setup, Emily Farrugia for the fertile eggs, Bree Childs for finding a poultry breeder on Facebook who provided a variety of egg types to look at, and Ross Sudholz for the use of his chickens.


